

The other highlight of the month was that my film, What Is Not Remembered was reviewed by the generous creatives as part of the Fresh Eyes initiative of the Nonfiction Hotlist! They describe themselves as "a collective of nonfiction storytellers behind acclaimed, award-winning content, curating a vetted list of unproduced projects that deserve champions. Amplifying such stories across the industry will ensure more of them find their way into the world — and into the hearts of audiences." We had a great conversation, discussing my current challenges and next steps. We brainstormed solutions, and they offered actionable feedback on how to further refine my project.



Echoing their generosity, I continue to work with other filmmakers, helping them develop their films. One film emphasizing visual storytelling, which is worthy of your support, and mine, is Harvey: Eyes on the Struggle, which the filmmaker describes as: "Harvey: Finkle spent over 50 years photographing social change movements until disease destroyed his sight and ended his career. Harvey: Eyes on the Struggle. The feature-length documentary film explores his life, his commitment to justice, and his bold, iconic images." My friend, and the filmmaker, Ted Lieverman, is seeking tax-deductible contributions to finalize the 60-minute rough cut.




NEWS YOU CAN USE:
